Estonia: Matsalu Nature Centre

The core group is in contact with Matsalu Nature Centre in Estonia. We hope that they will join the Migratory Birds for People -network. This remains uncertain right now, but discussion is continued. (R.H.)

Matsalu National Park (previously **Matsalu Nature Reserve**, Estonian: *Matsalu rahvuspark*, often just **Matsalu**) is a nature reserve and national park situated in Lääne County, Estonia. Matsalu National Park spans an area of 486.1 km² (187.7 sq mi), comprising Matsalu Bay, the Kasari River delta, and surrounding areas.

Matsalu Bay (Estonian: *Matsalu laht*) is one of the most important wetland bird areas in Europe, due to its prime position on the East Atlantic Flyway. Large numbers of migratory birds use Matsalu as a staging area. Every spring over two million waterfowl pass Matsalu, of which around 1.6 million are Long-tailed Ducks.

Matsalu National Park is a home for a number of endangered species, many of which are listed in the Estonian IUCN Red List, including the White-tailed Eagle of the highest conservation category, a lot of bird species of the second and third protection categories, 22 strongly protected plant species, the Natterjack Toad, and ten species of mammals of the second conservation category.

Germany: Nationalpark - Haus Husum

Nationalpark-Haus Husum:

Pupils discover the Wadden Sea's essential role as stopping-place for migratory birds. Suitable for classroom teaching as well as for Wadden Sea education in visitor centres. United Kingdom: Slimbridge

On the morning of October 27th, the first Bewick's swan arrived at Slimbridge. After careful analysis of its bill markings, the bird was recognised as 3 year old Humbugs.

There have been up to eight seen so far, including the first family of the year (Lucius, Aoki, and their Cygnet). At Slimbridge we continue to look out for any new arrivals over the coming weeks., hopefully having around 300 by mid December.

In 2011, in north eastern Russia, we took the first steps towards starting a conservation breeding program for the Spoon-billed Sandpiper. The first year of the program gave us 17 chicks, and this year we are rearing a further 11, giving us a total of 28 birds. This may sound like a small number of birds, but for the Spoon-billed Sandpiper it is a shocking 10% of its entire population. If we can reach our target of having at least 10 females, then by 2015 we can return as many as 40 eggs a year to Russia, where they'd be hatched and reared in their breeding grounds.

News from the Uitkerkse Polder, autumn 2012

During summer, the number of inhabitants of Blankenberge - the closest town to the Uitkerkse Polder – raises from 17.000 to sometimes over 250.000. Unnecessary to say that this has implications for the nature reserve: traffic is the main challenge. The other one is how to reach these hundreds of thousands of beach and shopping tourists with our story about birds and salty meadows in the polders.



Each summer, Natuurpunt launches its 'Summer campaign' in an effort to attract tourist to our nature reserves. With great success: each summer, thousands of people learn to know the value of 'the land that is behind the dunes'. Unfortunately, last July was windy and rainy, so rather calm. August then again, was warm and sunny.

For the first time in many years, the numbers of breeding meadow birds didn't reach another all time high, but of course, there's no such thing as unlimited growth, neither in the economy, nor in nature! The main species did quite well, so there are no immediate worries, although groundwater levels are to be monitored closely.

For the last few weeks, a dozen nature guides are taking a course on agriculture and nature conservation. They learn about the existing practices and about how things have to and can change towards a more sustainable agriculture (organic farming, agro-forestry, permaculture *)) For a nature guide, it remains a permanent effort to broaden your view on the main actors in the field.

Very admirable was the effort of two of our female volunteers. They made a pilgrimage to Compostella in an effort to raise funds for a water mill, that is to help raise water levels in parts of the nature reserve. You can check there blog on:

Spain: Aiguamolls de l'Emporda

In Aiguamolls Natural Park, during last breeding season, the management of the wetland has focused on



aquatic birds, as well as trying to keep water levels in the best conditions for watching wildlife next to the public access areas. Breeding season has not been but, with more than 30 pairs of Purple Heron, up to 59 pairs of white stork or more than 25 pairs of Roller, nice numbers of



Moustached Warbler (1) (Acrocephalus melanopogon), and the first

pair ever of **Baillon's Crake** (2) (*Porzana pusilla*) with chicks grown in Aiguamolls. However, species such as Marsh Harrier, Purple Gallinule or Black-necked Stilt have decreased the number of breeding pairs.

On the other hand, Aiguamolls Natural Park managers have worked hard in arranging water channels, ponds and marshes, with new tools to regulate the main water levels. That management is important for birds, as well as fishes, so they are able to penetrate inside some areas such as Massona Lagoon from Sirvent channel.

MónNatura Delta – a new visitor centre in the Ebro Delta by Fundació CatalunyaCaixa



We are very pleased to inform the MBP-network of the inauguration of the new visitor centre in the Ebro Delta "Món Natura Delta". This new centre is located in the old buildings of a fish farm next to la Tancada lagoon now owned by our Foundation. This infrastructure is actually next to one of the areas restored through the LIFE+ Project 09/NAT/ES 000520 "Habitat restoration and management in two coastal lagoons of the Ebro Delta"... actually we're very proud of the restoration process and invite you all to come and visit it with us.

We already have Pied avocets (Recurvirostra avocetta), Little terns (Sternula albifrons) and Kentish plovers (Charadrius alexandrinus) nesting next to the visitor centre only one month after finishing the restoration works!

MónNatura Delta is targeted to schools during weekdays and families and ornithologists over the weekends. The most valued assets of the centre according to the first thousand of visitors are: the recreation of the old salt pans ("salines") to understand how salt is extracted from seawater.

Great opportunities for the West African centres under Migratory Bird for People (MBP)

From Arctic to Africa: Migratory birds connecting wetlands and people also known as the Arcadia Project is a new initiative, which will use a people-connecting approach, which involves local stakeholders in conservation planning. "The project aims to build new bridges of cooperation at the sites and a strong network across the flyway through sharing of expertise and experience and to raise the awareness and capacity of local authorities to wisely manage their wetland resources".

The project which is focused in the East Atlantic flyways has also strong linkages between the key centres within West Africa through the "Migratory Bird for People" -program.

The three (3) centres: Djoudj (Senegal); Bang d'Arguin (Mauritania) and Bubaque (Guinea Bissau), even far from each other, will be connecting through waterbird monitoring and capacity building of the staff and volunteers involved in the different centres. This project came at the right time and it will be managed at the Hub of the MBP (Wetlands International Africa office) in Dakar, Senegal.

Other ongoing projects (Strengthening networks for the conservation of migratory birds and their habitats along the west coast of Africa; the Wadden Sea flyway initiative) implemented on ground are also supporting the centre activities.

In the framework of monitoring migratory waterbirds along the coast of West Africa and capacity building for the implementation of the regional Monitoring Strategy adopted in June 2012 in Dakar, Senegal, the Diawling National Park in collaboration with Nature Mauritania, BirdLife international, Wetlands International and the Wadden Sea Flyway Initiative (WSFI) are holding a training course on "monitoring waterbirds and their habitats along the West African coast" in December 4th to 6th 2012 in Diawling National Park in Mauritania. The course will take place at the next door of the Djoudj centre where most transboundary activities are carried out.



The workshop aims to provide future trainers with monitoring tools and reminded them about best practices in counting and monitoring waterbirds and site conditions, as well as the importance of planning and organization for successful monitoring at the site level.

This is an important start to bring the key people of the different centres to share important tools.



Other network news

New phase in "Migratory Birds for People" program: linking scientific research to the MBP-network. It is essential for the program to connect the scientific research on bird migration to the network. Therefore we decided that it was time now to make initial steps to build relationships with researchers in this field.



- The 5th of November Roelof Heringa and Theo de Bruin have discussed the MBP-program with Dr. Jeroen Reneerkens (State University of Groningen). He works closely together with Prof. Dr. Theunis Piersma (RUG). After explaining "Migratory Birds for People" and its goals, we stressed the benefits for both parties to work together in future. Working with our network would give new projects a broader support and therefore better funding-opportunities. Our suggestions will be discussed in the research group. (to be continued)
- Of course there are other research programs running in other universities: for instance Lund (Sweden), Amsterdam etc. We intend to initiate also contacts there.




"Migratory Birds for People" certificate

Ramsar COP11 6-13 July 2012 Bucharest, Romania

The Ramsar COP happens every 3 years and is an opportunity for the contracting parties (governments) of the Ramsar Convention to come together and review progress and set new targets for the convention. It took place in Bucharest, Romania, from the 6th to the 12th of July. This year they looked at resolutions including whether to move the hosting organisation (it has stayed with IUCN), new formats for reporting on Ramsar Sites, wetlands and health, and wetlands and tourism, the key theme of the COP.



Taej Mundkur and Chris Rostron attended the COP, along with 2,000 other people, and MBP-information was included on the WLI information stand. Taej and Chris also asked for inclusion of 'wetland centres and flyways' in the resolution in the Resolution on tourism.

In addition, we held a 'wetland centres and flyways' side event with representatives from all the major flyway initiatives present at the COP, and used it as an opportunity to discuss how wetland centres could work with

flyways to better deliver messages about migratory birds to local people, as well as use local information and survey work to provide better data.

WLI information sheets

As a new tool for those working at wetland centres, WLI is producing a series of information sheets on issues that are likely to be of interest to those involved in wetland centres and education. The format is a 'two sides of A4', offering an introduction to the topic, with further links and resources.

The first topic is on constructed wetlands as water treatment systems, and this will be followed by 'wetland centre development', 'evaluation of wetland visitor groups', and 'engaging the public in bird breeding programmes'. You can see the first one at the WLI website

News from the Core group

Migratory Birds for People – Project planning meeting Skype Wednesday, 19th September, 2012, 10.00-11.00 CET

- 1. Updates from partners (including the new WI project 'From the Arctic to Africa: migratory birds connecting wetlands and people' that includes twinning and capacity building work with sites on the East Atlantic Flyway)
- Roelof is talking with partners from the Waddensee Initiative and Staatsbosbeheer, region North in the Netherlands to get closer contacts.
- ➤ Roelof and Theo are planning to visit Husum (G) and Vestamager (DK) in Autumn to meet and discuss opportunities.
- > Theo A film being produced about Oostvaardersplassen. A meeting is also planned soon to decide if the Ooostvaardersplassen- wetland centre will be delivered.
- Taej Wetlands International have been successful with funding from Arcadia, developing the East Atlantic flyway concept, and focusing on the Nenetsky Oblast in Russia (a major area for waterbirds such as the Bewick swan). Looking at the Pachora Delta and an area of gas/oil development linking with the Wetland International Shell partnership. Naynmar Museum will be the focus of capacity building work with local people. Also organizing regional training for managers of Ramsar sites and protected areas.
 - The southern site is at Djoudj, Senegal, carrying out similar training for site managers, including monitoring and capacity building. Mark van Romany is the project officer.
 - At the same time, the MAVA funded project continues, and joint work will complement the two projects. Some work taking place over the border in Mauritania. Planning some exchange visits between managers in Europe and Africa, so will also complement the MBP / WLI work. Frank Hoffman is the project manager for the Arcadia project.
- ➤ Ellen has had 60,000 visitors in the first three months, 4 times what was expected! Local people are very impressed, and many say they are proud to be associated with the centre. Some technical problems, but being resolved. Also the Tåkern Fund is celebrating its anniversary, and will hopefully be the source of funding for the June meeting.
- Chris WLI held a side event at the Recent Ramsar COP (conference of parties), looking at links between wetland centres and flyway networks. Also had information booth at the COP with material from MBP.
- 2. EACEA bid start work on updating this for February 1st 2013 submission

Most of the bid is still viable, but we could put in the Tåkern Field Station people (possible € 2,500 match funding through Tåkern Fund), as well as look at what Wetlands International might be able to provide (in return for some outputs for them too). CR to check the Camargue CSO link.

CR to produce a summary of the project for circulation, and to talk to Robert Kieft of the Dutch support agency to ensure that the deadline / guidance is the same. To be finalized at the Genk meeting, and submitted shortly after. CR to check what kind of role Governmental Organisations can have (cover travel and accommodation, for instance?)

3. Core group meeting in Genk?

RH has already been invited to the Eurosite / Europarc meeting. The main issue on the agenda will be proposals to merge the two organisations. Neil McIntosh has offered a side room for an MBP meeting, afternoon of the 24th of October. RH, TdB, TM, CR possible attendees, and maybe LC who is not too far away.

4. Plan for next MBP meeting – Tåkern? June 2013?

EH confirmed that June is the best time to have a meeting (earlier is too cold and the migratory birds have not yet arrived). The Tåkern Fund is a likely source of support. June 10th? Planning meeting in Genk will have some of the core group.

5. MBP Africa

Abdoulaye is not present, so no update.

6. Date of next meeting and AOB: 24th October, Genk, Belgium.

1. Re-visit work-plan and aspirations for the project, including role of WLI and support from WWT

Introduction from Freek Zwart – works for Staatsbosbeheer based on the Friesian / Wadden Islands Vlieland & Terschelling, but also looking after international affairs and communications for Staatsbosbeheer. Works closely with the visitor centres too, including some that are under non-Staatsbosbeheer management, so has good understanding and contact.

1. General situation of partners:

All partners facing similar financial and resource difficulties. For WWT, 2012 has seen a combination of lower visitation, economic downturn and the Olympics – all mean that WWT now focusing energies on internal development rather than external, which mean less support available to project such as MBP. However there is still commitment to the WLI initiative.

- Wetlands International is also feeling the impacts of the wider economic situation, and is currently going through a restructure, with increase vigilance on time spent on development activities such as MBP.
- > Staatsbosbeheer has decided not to build a centre at Oostvaardersplassen yet! But are putting resources into preparing the area for a possible future construction project, so it can be considered 'on-hold'. A film is being made of Oostvaardersplassen, which will be on general release in September next year. This is expected to generate more visitors and then the pressure for a new centre is likely to increase too. Plans for a 'temporary' structure in the meantime are now considered. Theo de Bruin is writing a new tourism programme for the Waddensea area. Options exist for inter-reg and other funds.

Staatsbosbeheer is planning to sell some land for summer house development, which it is hoped will generate money for socio-economic and cultural projects. This could be complemented by

Wadden Sea development money, if interesting projects are put forward. Useful to think about how MBP can involve the Wadden Sea initiative more. FZ showed a project on satellite tracking of spoon bills, could fit nicely with MBP.

- ➤ Natuurpunt Bob is only part time and does not have time to cover MBP work, so this is falling to Liesbet. Natuurpunt running many projects currently, and so staff time is stretched.
- RH has been in contact with Estonia (mrs. Kaja Lotman) and will send her contacts. Also has a contact in Latvia with someone that is involved in wetland networks.

2. Workplan

On re-examination, the workplan is well put-together, clear and with achievable objectives. Many of the actions for the lead group have been achieved, but we still need to make progress with actions at partner centres. Without more funding, this could be difficult, so some of the outcomes may remain on the 'to do' list for a while, but useful to have in the plan.

Communications is going well thanks to Roelof's newsletter and development of new WLI website. More action needed on communication at centre level. Need core group to push some of these e.g. an inventory of some basic details such as visitor numbers, list of resource etc. **CR to produce a draft.** Drop box mentioned as communication tool – but need to decide if we use the Website or Dropbox for sharing documents – **CR to check options for 'private members' area and for discussion forum**. Still need to communicate with 'managers and decision-makers' within organizations – although we have a good selection of wetland centre staff, it would be useful to have the management on board too. **CR to prepare a letter for use by staff, and ask Ramsar Secretariat staff to sign it.**

Languages came up as an issue. EAAFP provide their documentation in 7 languages, often translated by the relevant host country. We have at least 10 languages along MBP, and should focus on having at least English / French / Spanish for most documentation, and one key document (Roelof's poster) in the 10 languages. Ask the partners to provide translations. WLI Website already in Fr/En/Es.

Capacity-building for staff. Through annual international meetings, works well. But otherwise? EACEA bid could provide this, but needs work. Could be building resource bank through the WLI website (discuss later). Options for 'online' training via skype or other? Could be easy to organize, low cost and minimal travel time, sharing best practice amongst partners. CR to send link to online lectures produced for Pakistan.

TM mentioned POWPA (programme of work for protected areas) of CBD. Online training produced for this through IUCN, **TM to send the link**.

Network development:

MBP highlighted at various international meetings including Ramsar, MedWet meeting, (AEWA planned but didn't happened), Eurosite/Europarc etc. Also active recruitment of partners is happening through existing members.

Have stronger links now with the 3 West Africa centres (although not much active communication directly with them).

Suggestion that we all prodcude documentation to share, which could either be sent as hard copy of put on the website in digital form.

Fund-raising:

So far unsuccessful. Willingness to put in Euro-bids, but not achieved, despite investment of time and money (Staatsbosbeheer) into development. Darwin bid unsuccessful for West Africa (but still possible in the future). Barriers to bid success:

- Difficulty in finding lead partner to submit bid.
- Lack of suitable match-funding.
- Lack of clarity between communication/engagement and biodiversity.
- Diverse geographical area. For instance, Africa and Russia are not easily fundable through EU funding streams.

How can this be more successful??

- Be more imaginative in terms of match-funding and how MBP fits with planned / existing projects to deliver its objectives.
- Build MBP into planned projects use it to bring in funding for migratory bird-related projects.
- Identify partners that are prepared to lead on a major EU bid.
- Be clear about whether we are working on communications/engagement or delivery of biodiversity outputs. This can vary according to the element of MBP we are working on, which funder we are targeting.
- Find funding sources that cover Europe / Africa / Russia. Look at funders that just cover Africa / Russia and fit with EU element. E.g. WI Russia Matra bid.

2. EACEA bid – continue work on updating this for February 1st 2013 submission

Identify lead partners.

Natuurpunt is in principle happy to lead on this, depending on the amount of work. However, discussions with the Belgian advisor seemed to imply that the 'town twinning' funding would be better. On inspection of the EACEA website, it did not seem an easy fit, so likely to stick to our first option. Other partners should include largely NGOs, but can also involve GOs or other groups as long as they are not acting as 'official' partners. FZ offered some support, but this would need to be spent within a short timescale.

Confirm activities and outputs

Existing structure of the bid was supported. To be put into format suitable for Natuurpunt. Three visits between Takern / Camargue / Natuurpunt. Detail for LC to discuss.

Work out eligible match funding and costs

Options for us to use match-funding from external sources. Increasing the travel and subsistence funding would lower the current percentage on staff time.

3. Future planning for funding and development opportunities

RH/FZ/TdB mentioned the University of Graulingen (sp?) which conducts detailed work on bird-tracking, but want to publicise / popularize its work. MBP could offer ways of helping with this.

FZ also mentioned the Eurosite working group on spoonbill tracking – could offer some additional interest for MBP.


4. WLI website opportunities for MBP


